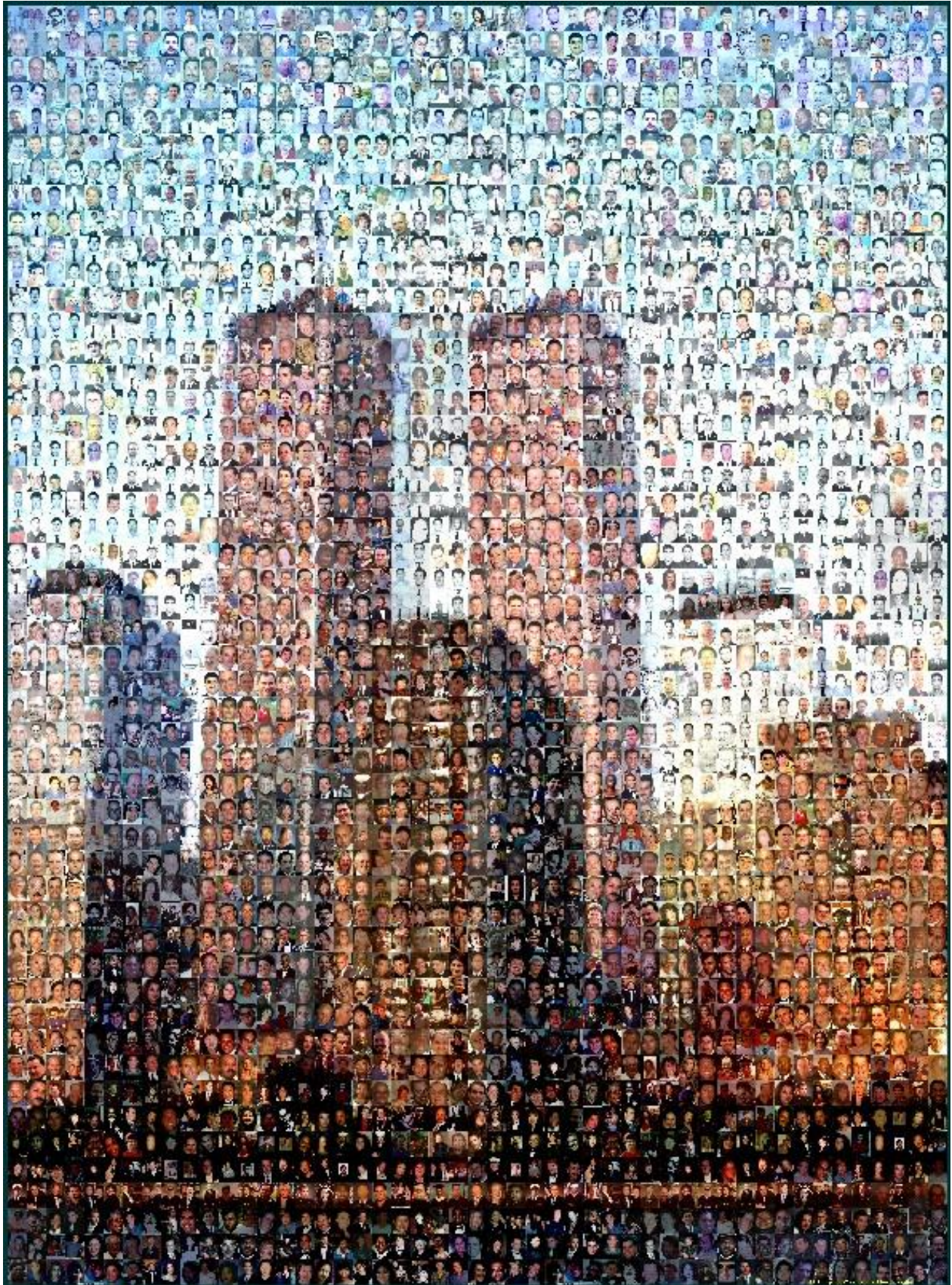

Minutes: General Membership Meeting of August 6, 2019

The meeting was called to order at 6:07pm by President Bill Cooper.

No corrections were noted to the July meeting minutes; a motion was made by Don Goulet, seconded by Dave Osborn, and the minutes were approved by the membership. There were no guests or new members in attendance.

In Programs, PIP at the PressRoom Pub has been discontinued. Tom Hornstein told Bill he had spent \$4,000 on bands and advertising. We had agreed to \$1 per person in attendance and he said he didn't think there were more than 50 on any evening. We decided to pass on getting any payment, giving him a break, and hoping to retain goodwill. Laurie Reed from the Downtown Committee said the Arts & Crafts BBQ went well with Peppino's as their caterer, but it cost them much more. They wanted to confirm that the UDT will produce it next year, which will be the festival's 50th anniversary year. She thought attendance for the show as a whole was down this year; Bill was told Harborfest (on same weekend) was down about 15% as well.

Under Public Relations, note was made that the UDT's 40th Anniversary is coming in 2020. Len suggested billboard advertising; one of the smaller ones can cost \$300-\$400 per month. Other comments: seek government proclamations, revive Funds Distribution, modify UDT logo to reflect anniversary, look for records from 25th anniversary for ideas & budget. Bill called artist Mike Canavan during meeting about getting the file of the logo he used for the PIP mock-up poster to us to send to the Redhouse.

In Membership, the Meet Out/Eat dates for August were as noted in the newsletter, on the 13th, 23rd, 26th and 27th. There is Bingo at Liverpool Elks on the 7th, an outing to the Zoo on Saturday the 10th, and a Walk & Talk on Monday the 19th, plus the Onondaga Ski Club Happy Hour on the 16th at The Reef. There was no new Sunshine to report.

Break (6:40pm – 7:12pm)

Special Events Director Diane Knowlton noted the following volunteer opportunities: Parade of Homes from Sept. 14 - 29 in Clay and Empire State Marathon on Sunday, October 13th beginning & ending at NBT Bank Stadium.

The Vice President, Don Goulet had nothing to report.

Treasurer Ann Goehner reported balances as of June 30th as Checking: \$15,970.71 and Investment: \$249,843.16.

There was no Unfinished Business, New Business, or Membership Announcements. There was no 50/50 drawing.

Motion to adjourn was made at 7:21pm by Don Goulet and seconded by Yvonne Russell.

Fun Fact: Syracuse Suds is the city's oldest modern craft brewer. It first opened in The Amos Building in Clinton Square in 1993, and moved to its current post in the Neal & Hyde Building in 1999.

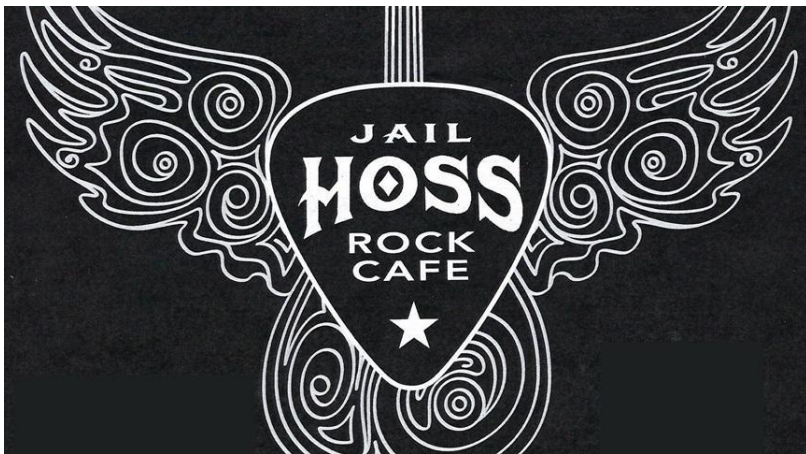
Eden Opens in Hanover Square

City's first kitchen entirely fueled by wood-fire

Eden, located at 118 E. Genesee Street in the Flagship Securities Building Hanover Square, boasts the city's first kitchen to be entirely fueled by wood-fire. With four cooking stations - including two adjustable grills, a wood-fired oven, and metal firebox - the kitchen is in elite company. It's one of the only ones of its kind in the country!

The menu will change weekly, featuring local, sustainable ingredients. The restaurant seats 40 people and features tables and benches cut from ash trees. The building is the first steel-frame structure in the City of Syracuse, and elements of the original wood have found their way into the design of Eden's bar and other aesthetic elements.

Eden is open for dinner at 5:00 pm Tuesday through Saturday. There are plans in the works to host special Sunday dinners from time to time, featuring menus designed by guest chefs from cities including New York, Chicago, Nashville and more.



After several Italian restaurants Sue and Hoss began selling apple cider donuts at the Regional Market in Syracuse. The donut stand became so popular that they decided to branch out with a donut shop in Liverpool. After two years they were certain that they could do better in the right location, which was eventually discovered at One Park Place on State Street. This 3500 square foot space was big enough for us to expand our menu to include breakfast and lunch and get back to their roots with homemade bagels, pizza, roast beef and burgers in addition to our donuts and coffee. Due to the expanded menu and proximity to the city jail, the courthouse, the police department and the sheriff's office, they've as the Jail Hoss Rock Cafe. It opened in January and it is owned and operated by Suzi, Logan and Rich Lickfield.
